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Second Annual 'Be Like Mike' Week Achieves Remarkable Success

Florida Keys – "Mangrove" Mike Forster was a force in our community and his legacy lives on through what is now the annual 'Be Like Mike' Week. Created in 2022, the goal was to remember the Monroe County Commissioner and restauranteur, who was a member of the United Way of Collier and the Keys' Local Advisory Board at the time of his passing in 2021. UWCK staff and board members planned an entire week to honor Forster's untiring commitment to making life better for Keys residents.

The tradition continued this year, spanning from October 16th to the 20th. UWCK partnered with Reef Relief to organize 3 impactful shoreline cleanup events, which achieved remarkable success cleaning up more than 600 pounds of trash, thanks to over 60 dedicated volunteers.

UWCK also partnered with Burton Memorial Church (BMC) in Tavernier, Keys Area Interdenominational Resource (KAIR) in Marathon and Star of the Sea Foundation (SOS) in Key West, for a food drive. A total of 8,099 pounds of food was collected across the three sites.
